BY THE NUMBERS:

- 749 Line Apprentices (100 are Local 160 hands)
 *3 Apprentices out of work
- 52 Substation Apprentices (4 are Local 160 hands)
- 18 Operator Apprentices (1 is a Local 160 hand)
- 18 Traffic Signal Apprentices
- 13 URD Technicians
- 6 Cable Splicing Technicians

For a grand total of 868 Apprentices and Trainees.

NEWS:

The International Lineman's Rodeo was held on October 13th and 14th this year. There were 1,316 journeymen and apprentice lineworkers that made up 732 teams from the U.S., Canada and Brazil. The local had 6 apprentices competing this year and 3 judges that were sent down to represent 160. This year the events for apprentices were: written multiple choice test, hurt-man rescue, egg climb, bad arrestor change out and replacing a preform on a span guy. The competition was tough this year! There was a total of 440 apprentices registered this year. It was great to see everyone competing and the brotherhood between all of the people who attended. To show you how tight the competition was, Dylan Kraemer who placed 28th overall in apprentice contractor division, his score this year, matched the 1st place winners score in our division last year in 2022! The results of our 160 apprentices in the overall contractor division are as follows: Dylan Kraemer (28th), Cole Solie (37th), Hunter Herzog (38th), Zach Gigstad (43), Ben Lieberg (50th), Nick Staloch (81). Our judges were: Jeff Bryczek, Garret Ernhart and Bryant Sand.

I would like to thank everyone mentioned above as well as the people in the hall who worked to help make this event happen. There is a fair amount of work behind the scenes. I would also like to thank the membership for continuing to vote to support theses activities. If anyone has any interest in getting involved, in either competing or judging, please reach out to me and we can see what we can do. This invitation goes out to anyone on the line side of our hall. I'd be happy to help coordinate.

SAFETY:

Recently there has been a few primary incidents in Mo Valley JATC's 7 state jurisdiction. A few broad common denominators are that MAD was being broken on energized primary & cover and/or rubber gloves & sleeves were not being utilized. Here is a reminder that Minimum Approach Distance (MAD) is measured from the closest energized component. However, if you are handling a conductive object such as a tail, tie or tool that can break MAD, you have to extend MAD that far as well.

There are a lot of different directions that we can take this conversation, but for this newsletter, here is a friendly reminder if you are working on de-energized transmission. If at any point you are handling something that is conductive and it can break MAD on energized under build, make sure you take the time to cover and wear the appropriate class PPE while handling the tails until you can trim them shorter or secure it to the point if it gets away, you won't break MAD below you. In one recent instance, it only caused an outage. In another, old armor rod being removed from a conductor caused an electrical injury but thankfully not a fatality.

Suicide Prevention 5 Things You Should Know

Suicide is a leading cause of death among workingage adults in the United States. It deeply impacts workers, families, and communities. Fortunately, like other workplace fatalities, suicides can be prevented. Below are 5 things to know about preventing suicide.

BE AWARE

Everyone can help prevent suicide.

Mental health and suicide can be difficult to talk about–especially with work colleagues–but your actions can make a difference. When you work closely with others, you may sense when something is wrong.

PAY ATTENTION

Know the warning signs of suicide.

There is no single cause for suicide but there are warning signs. Changes in behavior, mood, or even what they say may signal someone is at risk. Take these signs seriously. It could save a life.



3 REACH OUT

Ask "Are you okay?"

If you are concerned about a coworker, talk with them privately, and listen without judgment. Encourage them to reach out to your Employee Assistance Program (EAP), the human resources (HR) department, or a mental health professional.



TAKE ACTION

If someone is in crisis, stay with them and get help.

If you believe a coworker is at immediate risk of suicide, stay with them until you can get further help. Contact emergency services or the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline.
