A Tribute to Brother John Ness

Retired Business Representative John Ness passed away October 9, 2020, just 4 days shy of his 77th birthday.

John was born and grew up in the Sioux City, Iowa area. After high school John joined the U.S. Air Force with an honorable discharge after 4 years of service. John was stationed at an Air Force base right in the Northwestern corner of Iowa. At that time, he met the love of his life, Norma Jean in the town of Chandler, MN. Shortly after, John was transferred to Germany where he served for $1\frac{1}{2}$ years.



John started employment with NSP on July 11, 1966 at the Riverside Generating Plant. He worked as a Plant Equipment Operator(PEO) until June 1983 when he became a Business Representative for Local 160.

John was a very gifted speaker with a memory, "like a steel jawed trap". John's knowledge of power plant operations made him an authority to reckon with. He also had a unique style of communication. In meetings with management, usually defending a union member, in a contentious setting, John was often bordering offensive to management, but his style would not be perceived as that.

John had a very colorful and articulate manner. He never forgot a joke and had an endless list. Just when you thought you'd heard all he knew; John would tell new ones. John added a lot of laughter, humor and color to the everyday business at Local 160.

After John's retirement, June 2002, he enjoyed his classic car collection. Every weekend was reserved for a car show someplace. His garage wall has a full-length shelf full of trophies won at these shows. John and Norma moved up to the Brainerd Lakes area when he retired and he enjoyed fishing with his grand kids and of course his cars.

John became sick with the Covid virus last fall and passed away on Oct. 9, 2020.

History of the IBEW 160 Scholarships

Local 160 administers three Scholarships, Amy O' Sullivan, Dave Ring and Nathan Blomquist Memorial Scholarships. So who were these people and why were these scholarships created?

The Amy O' Sullivan Scholarship was established on May 13, 1996, Business Manager Dave Ring presented Amy with this scholarship in recognition of 50 years of service to Local Union 160.

Amy was hired in 1936 and was quickly promoted to office manager of our local. Even though she was not an elected officer of our union, Amy served as a cornerstone making sure that the business of our local was conducted properly regardless of the experience of the Union's elected staff and officers.



As explained in a letter from International Vice President James Conway in 1986, "Over these past many years I have seen you train so many business managers that I wish we could have put your knowledge in a training booklet and used it district wide. I say that only because I mean it, and because I think you have been fantastic; not just for Local Union 160 but for all of the Northern States Power Locals.

Amy, I can't say enough about your obvious secretarial skills, your knowledge of our organization, your dedication to Local Union 160..."

She would serve as office manager of Local 160 from 1936 to 1998.

The Dave C Ring Scholarship was established in 2007 in memorial to our local's longest serving Business Manager. Dave's history with our local was a long one; first becoming a member working in NSP's Minneapolis Underground Department in 1954, he served on the Executive Board from 1964-69, Vice President 1969-72, a Business Representative 1979-83 and Business Manager 1983-2004. Dave's compassion and intelligence left an undeniable impact on local 160 and Minnesota's IBEW Locals.

When Brother Dave C Ring passed away on June 17, 2007, the executive board thought it only right to honor a man who had made such an impact with the ability to further benefit generations to come. What was then, "The Local 160 Scholarship", was renamed, "The David C. Ring IBEW Local 160 Scholarship" in his honor.

The Nathan Blomquist Memorial Scholarship was founded on October 2011 in honor of our fallen brother. Brother Nathan was a 4th step apprentice in Missouri Valley. Though he hadn't been in the trade for long, he was known for his positive attitude and work ethic. He was shaping up to be the epitome of the saying, "Find a job you enjoy doing and you'll never work a day in your life." Tragically, on April 12, 2010 Brother Nathan was involved in a car accident on his way to work. His family decided that his legacy would be to help others find their way into the trade which Nathan had only just started in.

On Jan. 27, 2021, Biden began taking executive action to address climate change.
